Although the full-time support staff of all Ontario colleges are currently on strike, please be assured that the college is operating, employment services for the general public are available, and academic programs are running. We will do our very best to provide you with the services that you need.

You will be required to cross a picket line when you arrive at any one of our campuses.

Many people have asked what this strike is about.

At this time, the colleges have provided a good offer that increases the average salary for support staff to more than \$59,000 after three years. If OPSEU, the union representing the support staff, were to accept the offer, each full-time support staff member would receive a salary increase of 4.8% over the next three years:

- Year 1 a salary increase of 1.5%
- Year 2 an additional salary increase of 1.5%
- Year 3 a further salary increase of 1.75%

The offer from the colleges does NOT reduce job security or increase the use of part-time employees instead of full-time employees.

The Union has rejected the offer and is asking for:

- 6.1% salary increase over two years
- Additional costs for retiree benefits
- Additional paid leave time for union activities

Although we want to reach a negotiated settlement that is reasonable to our employees, it must also be affordable to the colleges. We hope that OPSEU will call off the strike and return to the bargaining table so that we can reach a resolution.

The quality of your educational and other employment service experiences here at Conestoga are very important to us. We apologize for any delays or inconvenience that you may experience as a result of the strike, and ask for your understanding and patience as we work to maintain services and ensure your learning is supported through this very challenging situation.
